

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Know Your Rights!

Each person, with or without documents, has rights. Therefore, if INS agents try to interrogate or detain you in any way, remember your rights:

1. You have the right to refuse to answer questions, with the exception that you must give your name. Refuse to answer questions. Say nothing about your place of birth or the way in which you entered this country until you can consult with your lawyer.
2. Demand to speak with your lawyer. Demand respect of your right to make a telephone call.
3. If you do not have a lawyer, request a list of free immigration lawyers and call them.
4. You have the right to communicate with the consulate of your country of origin. Request of INS to give you the phone number of your consulate.
5. If you have any possibility to qualify to be able to immigrate, do not sign the "Voluntary Departure" without consulting with your lawyer or consulate.
6. If this is your first entry, and you do not have any way of immigrating legally, it is then better to sign the "Voluntary Departure" to avoid a "formal deportation," which has serious consequences.
7. You have the right to a Deportation Hearing. Consult with your lawyer. Do not speak to the Immigration Official.

The Importance of Remaining Silent:

Before deporting a person, INS must prove that that person is in the U.S. illegally. Normally, the evidence comes from the answers that were given to the Immigration official during interrogation. If the person does not answer questions, then INS does not have the proof that they need to deport the individual.

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
